





TRAVELLING WITH FORTRESS

EXPERIENCE HIDDEN TREASURES OF SRI LANKA

The Warakoagoda Temple can be found on the outskirts of Kalutara. Surrounded by tall lush trees and a beautiful small lake, the temple attracts different types of birds and mammals, making it a perfect stop for nature lovers.

The Warakoagoda Temple dates back to the 12th century leading us to believe that it was built during the same period as the well-known Dambulla Rock Cave Temple. Some archaeologists state that the temple was built during the Polonnaruwa Kingdom (10th-11th century) based on its ruins and architecture. According to historical records, during a fierce battle between Prince Maharana and King Jayabahu of the Polonnaruwa Kingdom, Price Maharana retreated to Pasydun Koralaya (the present area of the temple) where he built a fortress to protect himself from King Jayabahu. During your tour at the Warakoagoda Temple, witness well-preserved human size statues that represent the life story of Lord Buddha along with several other art artifacts that date back to the 10th-11th century.

The bungalow is located amidst a 50 acres rubber & tea plantation. The Thebuwana Bungalow was the home for wealthy British Planters and takes pride in its 125 year old history.





THE RICHMOND CASTLE

HOME TO THE RUBBER KING OF CEYLON

The Richmond Castel was a British Ceylon noble residence built in the 19th Centaury for one of the most affluent men in British Ceylon, Nanayakkara Rajawasala Appuhamilage Don Arthur De Silva Wijesinghe Siriwardena. He was the District Mudaliyar (Cheif of the area) in Kalutara during the late decades of the 1800 and early 1900s. The architectural design of the castle was influenced by the Roman-Dutch concept that belonged to the 18th and 19th centuries. The mansion was built on 42 acres of land, with two floors which include a banquet hall, performing theatre, 16 bedrooms with a total of 99 doors and 34 windows. Most of the manufacturing materials were imported from all around the world to build this magnificent residence. In fact, the Richmond Castle was opened for a special occasion, the Mudaliyar's wedding. A special train was chartered to Kalutara which escorted the British Royals to the wedding.

During your visit to the Richmond Castle, a complete guided tour will be provided inside the mansion by one of the local representatives.







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
